MINUTES LINCOLN COUNTY REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY (LCRDA) CALIENTE CITY HALL November 4, 2019

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Hurd at 4:30 pm.

Determination of Quorum: The following Board members were in attendance: Mr. David Hurd Mr. Jay Schofield Commissioner Varlin Higbee Councilman George T. Rowe Mr. Nolan Avery Ms. Emilia Cargill (via telephone) Mr. Eric Bernal (via telephone)

The following Board members were absent: Mr. Regen Gubler

Member of the public: Mr. Bill Brewer, Executive Director, Nevada Rural Housing Authority (via telephone), John Huston and Jan Cole.

Public Comment

Ms. Cole said that the Caliente Hot Springs worked hard on the movie that was produced and read an article from the Lincoln County Record noting that the Caliente Hot Springs Motel and Spa was incorrectly listed as the Warm Springs Motel.

Approval of Minutes

Chairman Hurd asked if there were any changes to the September 16, 2019 meeting minutes and seeing none, he asked for a motion to approve. Mr. Schofield moved to approve the September 16, 2019 meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by Mr. Avery and was approved unanimously.

Financial Report and Quarterly Expenditures

Mr. Fontaine referred to the back-up material in the Board packets under TABS 2A, 2B, 2C, 2D and 2E and said that the Financial Report was under TAB 2A and that changes since the last report in September have been highlighted and included invoices pending approval from the Board today. He noted his invoice for services which was under TAB 2B and six invoices for services from Mr. Rowley which were under TAB 2C. He said that Invoices: 1556, 1592 and 1596 from Mr. Rowley were for services related to the Trail Map Project and would be reimbursed under the Regional Development Authority's Recreational Trails Program grant. Mr. Fontaine said that the invoice from High Impact Sign & Design, LLC was a 50 percent deposit for the panels for the NDOT Community Signs that are being installed around the County and that they would be paid from the funds received by churches and service organizations that are sponsoring the signs. He

then said the invoice under TAB 2E is from Mountain Mercantile, Inc for cement needed to install the trail information kiosks and that it would be reimbursed under the Regional Development Authority's OHV Program grant. Chairman Hurd verified that the cost for two NDOT sign panels would be \$92.56 and noted that Mr. Rowley's invoice included the cost associated with the sign panels. Mr. Fontaine said there are some administrative costs associated with the community signs that the Development Authority will probably have to cover since it was not possible to know what those would be in advance of setting the cost to churches and clubs for the signs.

Councilman Rowe said that Mr. Schofield as not submitted requests for mileage to attend previous Development Authority meetings. Mr. Schofield declined to do so saying he was willing to pay his own transportation costs.

Councilman Rowe moved, and Mr. Schofield seconded a motion to approve the financial report and the invoices from Mr. Fontaine, Mr. Rowley, High Impact Sign and Design, LLC and Mountain Mercantile, LLC. The motion was approved unanimously.

Approval of Amendments to the Lincoln County Regional Development Authority Current Fiscal Year Budget to Align with the Governors Office of Economic Development (GOED) Reporting Requirements

Mr. Fontaine said that GOED revised its quarterly report form for regional development authorities to include how funds are budgeted for specific economic development activities, and what percentage are state funds. He said that he would like to postpone action on this item to the next meeting but would be open to any questions or suggestions regarding the new form. He said that the next quarterly report is due January 10th.

Discussion and Possible Action Regarding Affordable Housing in the City of Caliente and Lincoln County

Mr. Fontaine said that affordable housing has been identified as a community need and an impediment to economic development in the City and County. He said there are many individuals and agencies that have a role in helping to provide housing and that he had worked with Nevada Rural Housing Authority for many years and they have experience and resources to provide affordable housing solutions for rural Nevada. He then introduced Mr. Bill Brewer, NRHA Executive Director, who was on the telephone.

Mr. Brewer referred to the NRHA Report for Lincoln County and said that Panaca and Pioche information needs to be updated and that the rest of the Report is accurate and up to date. He said the County grew between 2000 and 2010 and declined slightly between 2010 and 2016. He said that the housing demand that they know about in Caliente is 85 multi-family units for seniors and 25 units for families which would mostly be subsidized. He said that there are a number of overburdened households in the County that can use subsidies and that the median income declined due to recession. He said the two major factors in developing affordable housing are debt and operating and that the best way to reduce debt is with equity through tax credits. Mr. Brewer said that rural communities statewide get enough tax credits to do about 30 new units a year. He said another way to get projects done is Private Activity Bonds, but they typically need about 150 units to be cost effective. He said that affordability is defined as not more than 30% of your income is spent on housing and that there are only 1,500 vouchers for all rural Nevada. He said that they have some money to do a few small projects each year.

Update on Incentives for a Food Manufacturer to Relocate to Lincoln County: Mr. Fontaine said he had received information regarding a possible lease purchase option from the owner of a 5,000 square foot metal building on Clover Street and that he walked through the building with the owner earlier in the day. He said that he has not talked to the food manufacturer about the possible lease but that he would reach out to them soon. Mr. Fontaine said that even if the food manufacturer was not interested, he felt that the building could create economic opportunities for the City and that the Development Authority should consider working with the owner to make it available for other small manufacturing operations and businesses. Chairman Hurd said that it would be a good idea to continue promoting the idea and Mr. Schofield said that it could be used in conjunction with greenhouses to grow products.

Update on the QuanVerge Concept for Obtaining Renewable Energy and Materials from Pinyon Juniper Biomass and Bureau of Land Management Stewardship Agreements

Mr. Fontaine said that progress is being made on implementing QuanVerge's concept and that the most significant news is that BLM has confirmed that they have authority to enter into 20-year Stewardship contracts which was granted in the recent Farm Bill. He said BLM is still working on regulations on how to implement 20-year agreements and that the Ely District Office is willing to work with LCRDA to develop a scope of work for harvesting pinyon juniper. He said that the State contracting officer would have the final say. Mr. Fontaine said that he will be getting together with Stephen Clarke to develop a scope of work for the Stewardship agreement between BLM and LCRDA and the contractual agreement between LCRDA and QuanVerge. Mr. Fontaine also said that he and Stephen Clarke participated in the Pinyon Juniper Partnership workshop at Lake Tahoe last month and that officials from the BLM, U.S. Forest Service, State Forestry and private sector who also participated made very favorable comments regarding the proposed Lincoln County project and offered technical assistance. He said that Mr. Clarke is still on track to set up pilot studies next spring/summer.

Mr. Schofield said that this process could open the harvesting of other natural resources such as lithium.

Discussion on Developing a Rail Transloading in Lincoln County.

Mr. Fontaine said that he recently spoke to representatives from Salt River Materials and that they are continuing to evaluate options for constructing a rail transloading facility for future pozzolan mining operations between Caliente and Panaca. He also said that the

Nevada Department of Transportation has hired a rail consulting firm from Philadelphia, Strategic Rail Finance, to prepare a statewide rail plan. He said that the President of SRF, Michael Sussman, was in Caliente a few weeks ago and although he was unable to meet with him, he did have a follow up telephone conversation with Mr. Sussman about Lincoln County's needs. Mr. Fontaine said that he will be meeting with Mr. Sussman again this month in Carson City and that SRF may be able to assist in our efforts to develop a transloading facility.

Commissioner Higbee said he attended a meeting where there was interest in recycling in the west. He said that there was discussion about combining several counties in Utah and Nevada to take recyclables to Crestline where they could be processed, and that rail access is key. In response to a question from Chairman Hurd, Commissioner Higbee said that it would all recyclables including metal and glass. Mr. Scofield said that is how Crestline got started when Los Angeles wanted to bring their trash to Crestline.

Possible Action to Support Proposed Amendments to the Lincoln County Land Act of 2000 and the Lincoln County Conservation, Recreation and Development Act.

Commissioner Higbee wondered if we overlooked the utility corridor that needs to be relocated for expansion of the gold mine at Atlanta. Mr. Fontaine said he thought it was taken care of in Senate Bill 47 passed by Congress earlier this year and that he left a phone message and sent an e-mail to Meadow Bay Gold to make sure but has not heard back.

Mr. Fontaine said that he and Commissioner Higbee had conversations with the staff for Senator Cortez Masto and Representative Horsford about additional amendments to the Lincoln County Land Act to address community and economic development needs and that he updated the County's discussion paper that was prepared a few years ago and also drafted amendments that were approved by the Board of County Commissioners. He highlighted the proposed amendments and said that it would be helpful if LCRDA could take a formal action to support the discussion paper and proposed amendments. Chairman Hurd expressed concerns that the BLM was supposed to dispose of 90,000 acres over 15 years but only a small portion has been sold. Commissioner Higbee said that he recently met with the State BLM Director about ways to dispose of lands that the County would like sold.

Councilman Rowe moved, and Mr. Schofield seconded a motion to support the proposed amendments. The motion was approved unanimously.

Update on the Lincoln County Trail Maps Project.

Chairman Hurd said it appeared that quite a bit of work has been done on the maps. Mr. Fontaine said that Mr. Rowley drafted a county wide map which includes destinations and that it will be distributed for review by the various agencies and then he will prepare local maps as well. Mr. Fontaine said that Mr. Rowley will also develop brochures.

Update on Activities of the Lincoln County Authority of Tourism

Ms. Hurd provided an update on the activities of the Lincoln County Authority of Tourism prepared by LCRDA Chair Marcia Hurd which is attached to these minutes. He said that there were about 120 cyclists and others including spouses at the "soft opening" of the mountain bike trails and commented on the "Taste of Lincoln County." Chairman Hurd said that even though attendance at the OHV Summit was less than expected it was very successful and good for the hotels and restaurants. He also said that there are 17 bicycle racks ready.

Board Member/Executive Comments.

Councilman Rowe explained how the City determined the kiosk locations. Chairman Hurd noted that the City hired Carlson Architects for the Depot and Councilman Rowe said that work should start before end of year. Chairman Hurd said they still have not hired Holly's replacement and there was discussion that no one from the County or City was on the selection committee. Mr. Fontaine said that CYC is still waiting for the State to hire staff and that he sent an email to the Department of Health and Human Services Director requesting an update. Chairman Hurd asked about the Caliente flooding situation and Councilman Rowe said that NDOT representatives came to Caliente for a meeting a few weeks ago but they have not heard back from NDOT since then. Chairman Hurd asked about the phone call that Mr. Fontaine had with Ashley Korenblatt and Mr. Fontaine said that she works with Public Lands Solutions and that she wanted the Development Authority and County to review the BLM oil and gas leases that could impact mountain bike trails north of Caliente. Mr. Fontaine said the \$2 million for the Depot included in the state bond bill would not be available until two years from now at the earliest because bonds still need to be sold. He said that it is important to have the Depot restoration plans need to be completed so that the funds could be part of the first round of bonds.

Next Meeting: It was decided that the next meeting would be a teleconference on January 6th beginning at 4:30 p.m.

Public Comment: There was no public comment.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:45`p.m.

Frequently Asked Ouestions

What is the purpose of the program? The goal of the Federal Lands Access Program is to improve transportation facilities that provide access to, are adjacent to, or are located within Federal lands.

Who is eligible to apply? Eligible applicants include State, county, tribal, or city government agencies that <u>own or maintain</u> the transportation facility.

What types of projects will be considered? The Federal Lands Access Program supplements State and local resources for public roads, transit systems, and other transportation facilities accessing federal lands, with an emphasis on Federal high-use recreation sites and Federal economic generators. The NV PDC will give preference to funding for design, construction, or reconstruction. Preference will not be given to fund maintenance projects (e.g., crack sealing, chip seal, potholes, or drainage repair).

To Whom It May Concern:

Please accept this letter as Lincoln County Regional Development Authority's enthusiastic support for Dr. Stephen Clarke's application for a U.S. Forest Service Wood Innovation Grant. LCRDA has provided regional economic development services within Lincoln County and the City of Caliente for nearly 25 years.

The mean family and per capita income in Lincoln County are lower than the state average and with nearly 98% of the land in the County owned by the Federal government there are limited opportunities for economic development and diversification. Despite the availability of nearly one million acres of invasive pinyon-juniper in and adjacent to Lincoln County, its commercial utilization has not been realized.

For the past ten years LCRDA has evaluated several projects to utilize pinyon-juniper for renewable energy and products such as biochar. However, the cost to harvest and transport the biomass far exceeded its value. LCRDA has been working with QuanVerge for nearly a year to pursue an innovative and exciting approach for the large-scale utilization of available pinyon-juniper in Lincoln County and beyond. Dr. Clarke's proposal to utilize pinyon-juniper as a feedstock for emerging bio-mass products has the potential to transform the economy of Lincoln County while restoring our natural landscapes. LCRDA is taking proactive steps to support a large scale project by initiating a 20-year stewardship agreement with the BLM for available pinyon-juniper in Lincoln County and is also evaluating locations for a rail siding facility near the Union Pacific Railroad mainline which traverses the County and terminates at the Port of Los Angeles.

LCRDA is committed to working with QuanVerge in pursuing a pinyon-juniper utilization project and fully supports Dr. Clarke's application for a Wood Innovation grant.

Our approach is to work with stakeholders and local resources and businesses to utilize a renewable resource to supply the growing unmet need for sustainable products and services.

This will create local employment opportunities in harvesting and production with the potential to establish a *Center of Excellence* for advanced sustainable bioresources.



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NAICS Top Performers for Lincoln County, Nevada









Payments in Lieu of Taxes are amounts paid by the federal government in replacement of other revenue (such as property tax) that could otherwise be generated. It is to compensate the local communities for potential loss in revenue.


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General Fund Revenue

Revenues are the money brought in by the county from a variety of taxes and services. The major sources are property tax, consolidated tax, licenses and permits, charges for services, and transfers in (which includes various taxing entities).

General Fund Expenditure

Expenditures are budgeted to carry out specific program and service objectives. The budget is comprised of three main fund types: governmental, proprietary, and fiduciary. Functional areas include judicial, public safety, and public works.



Each year the difference between the revenues and the expenditures contributes to changing the end balance (seen below). A higher end balance marks a surplus and a lower end balance a deficit. A deficit is fine, especially if it counteracts a surplus from a previous year.

General Fund Ending Balance

Lincoln's ending balance remained consistently over half a million dollars year to year, with a peak in 2015 of over \$1.2 million.

Definition: Ad Valorem is a tax whose amount is based on the value of a transaction or of property, rather than on quantity or intrinsic value. In the state of Nevada, Ad Valorem most commonly refers to **property taxes**. The Net Proceeds from Mines Tax is a property tax assessed on minerals mined or produced in Nevada when they are sold or removed from the state.
